New Montessori school offers classes in Italian immersion

Italian Canadian parents who would like to preserve their linguistic heritage now have a unique educational opportunity for their children.

Maple Crest Private School, which opened its doors in September 2003, now offers Italian immersion classes for children ages 2 1/2 - 5 1/2.

Maple Crest is a Montessori school, and offers programs in both English and Italian. According to Dhan Aiyar, the school's director, the Italian immersion program is the first of its kind in the city of Vaughan.

Many first generation Italian-Canadians want their children to learn Italian in order to preserve a part of their heritage. They also

want their children to be able to speak with their grandparents. "It was because of the needs of the community that we came up with the idea of Italian immersion," said Mrs. Aiyar.

Parents have the option of enrolling their children for full or half day programs. Italian students attending the full day program receive instruction in both languages.


"When a child is enrolled in our program, they have the benefit of spending the morning in regular Montessori, and in the afternoon we move them to Italian immersion, so in the course of one day they are exposed to two programs, as well as the benefit of learning a second language," said Mrs. Aiyar.

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Getting a JUMP on good grades

John Mighton shows all kids are capable of good grades

John Mighton is a playwright whose work includes the 1992 Governor General's Award-winning Possible Worlds; he is an actor whose credits include Gus Van Sant's Academy Award-win-

ning Good Will Hunting; and he has a Ph.D. in mathematics. His new approach to teaching has helped thousands of inner city children. But if you read his book, Myth of Ability, you'll learn he's not a genius.

At least that's what he's trying to teach us. Simply put, the "myth of ability" is the false belief that some kids are naturally more "able" to succeed than others. When children start believing in this false

"hierarchy of intelligence," the results can be devastating.

Mighton founded JUMP (Junior Undiscovered Mathematical Prodigies) in 1988. The project was a response to an urgent need: many inner city kids who were struggling in the traditional classroom setting needed extra help, but teachers were too busy and parents couldn't afford private tutoring.

At the time, Mighton was a

Ph.D. student in mathematics. He decided to start up a free private school based on his views of education.

He developed a simple yet effective teaching method that stems from the belief that all children are capable of excelling in math if they are given appropriate instruction.

The great success JUMP has achieved suggests this belief is true. Today JUMP offers tutoring in four public schools, and

provides teaching assistants in fifteen schools.

"Our tutors come from all walks of life - actors, writers, students, teachers, business people, retirees and even scientists, engineers & mathematicians!"

It is a useful read for teachers, but also for parents whose kids are struggling at school (particularly in mathematics, although is relevant for education in general). Whether or not parents can afford a private tutor, Mighton's ideas are worth a look. They will offer encouragement and guidance to parents who in turn will need to provide these for their children.

“Parents of Italian background like the fact that we have both these programs under one umbrella,” she added.

The full day program runs from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Full day students get an hour break for lunch, followed by a short nap. Two snacks per day and a hot lunch are included in the cost of tuition.

The school also offers before- and after-school programs at no extra cost for parents who need the convenience. The after-school program includes a guided homework session that reviews what’s been learned during the day. After they are finished with their homework, students are free to play in the school’s gymnasium until their parents pick them up.

As for the curriculum, Mrs. Aiyar said that Italian immersion is much like regular pre-school instruction. “The content is basically the same as they have in pre-school and junior and senior. They learn shapes, colours, weather, seasons, the national anthem, words for different objects.” The only differ-

ence is that they do so in Italian.

Montessori schools are based on work of Italian educator and physician, Dr. Maria Montessori (1870-1952). Dr. Montessori was the first woman to receive a medical degree in the history of Italy, and was twice nominated for the Nobel Peace prize. All Maple Crest instructors are certified in Montessori teaching.

Mrs. Aiyar also said that Maple Crest will expand in September 2004, to include instruction for children up to grade 6. Classes from grade 1 onward will not be Montessori.

“From grade one onward we go to a private curriculum [recognized] by the ministry of education,” said Mrs. Aiyar.

This combination of Montessori teaching for early years and academic teaching in later grades is another thing that sets Maple Crest apart from other schools.

“We start [with children] 2 and-a-half and 3and-a-half, and we expose them to the practical and sensorial activities. Once they are 3 1/2 yrs old we start moving them more towards academics, in terms of learning lan-

guage, math, and culture. By the time they graduate from senior kindergarten to grade one, they’re ready to learn abstract terms.”

By this point the child is ready to learn from oral instruction or writing on the board. “From grade one we follow strictly the curriculum of the ministry.”

On weekends Maple Crest offers Italian classes for older children (seven and up), as well as French classes and a children’s art club. They also provide private tutoring for secondary school students who need help in math, calculus and data management

Maple Crest is located at 28 Roytec Rd. in Woodbridge. It is on the corner of Weston Road, between Highway 7 and Langstaff Road, just West of Highway 400.

Leading European methods the key to challenging students at North Hill Private School (toddler to Grade 6)

During this process students represent their knowledge through different forms of expression: words, drawing, painting, movement, sculpture, drama and music all play an important role in project work. Projects require students to think, to debate different options and look at the world from different perspectives.


York's largest music school encourages toddlers to express themselves musically

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


